

Winwick CE Primary School Behaviour Curriculum 2024-25

'In God's love, aspire and achieve to be the best'
1 Corinthians 16:14 'Do everything in love.'

Intent

As a Church of England School, our core values of love, respect and perseverance along with compassion, thankfulness, friendship, peace, and forgiveness underpin our approach to behaviour. As a school community, we are committed to creating an environment where exemplary behaviour is at the heart of productive learning. Everyone is expected to maintain the highest standards of personal conduct, to accept responsibility for their behaviour and encourage others to do the same. Our behaviour and reward policy guides staff to teach self-discipline and echoes our core values with a heavy emphasis on respectful behaviour, a partnership approach to managing poor conduct and interventions that support staff and children.

Implementation

The behaviour curriculum is taught explicitly during the first week of the Autumn Term alongside the curriculum. At the start of each term, the behaviour curriculum is revisited with pupils and will continue to be reinforced throughout the year. Teachers will also demonstrate these behaviours and ensure pupils have time to practise these. It is expected that all adults and pupils will know and demonstrate the behaviour curriculum in all areas of school including the playgrounds, dining hall and corridors.

Adaptations

While this curriculum is for all pupils, it will be applied differently in different year groups depending on pupils' ages and may be applied differently depending on individual pupils' SEND needs. Sensitivity must be applied at all times when teaching the curriculum.

Curriculum content to be covered in depth in Autumn Term 1 and revisited throughout the year.

Our children will know that there are behaviour expectations in school which are all underpinned by children being safe. These are our Winwick Values and are to show:

- Respect
- Courage
- Friendship
- Forgiveness
- Truth
- Generosity
- Trust & Hope

These are underpinned by our three core values: Love, Respect and Perseverance. Below are examples of how our core values are demonstrated in our school:

Being safe in school

- When sitting on a chair all four legs will be on the floor
- Tuck your chair under your table before you leave
- Walk in the corridors
- On the stairs, keep to the left and use every step
- Play games that do not become too physical
- Hold door open for people

In our school these are the behaviours that we expect to see:

Being Respectful

We expect all children and adults to:

- Say 'please' when asking for something
- Say 'thank you' when receiving something or someone does something nice
- Say 'good morning/afternoon' to adults when spoken to. An adult will be at the classroom door at the start of each school day.
- Hold doors open for others and stand aside to let adults through first
- To know that it is important to show gratitude to others by thanking people for what they have done
- Use a respectful tone towards others

Respectful Listening

Adults and children will agree on a signal to gain the attention of the children. This can be bespoke to each class. When children see or hear this then they should be silent and respond with **STAR.** A whole school signal to gain attention is clapping (clap, clap, clap-clap-clap),

We expect all children and adults to demonstrate **STAR** in response to the signal. This means:

- S Stop talking, put equipment down and sit/stand up straight
- T Track the speaker (look at the person who is speaking)
- A Attention at all times
- R Respecting others

Attention at all times and respecting others means:

- Not speaking when others are unless permitted to do so
- Putting a hand up to indicate wanting to contribute
- Not speaking until an adult asks for your answer/contribution
- Considering responses before sharing
- Building on what others have said
- Sharing answers/contributions in a clear voice and full sentences where appropriate

We all do respectful listening to ensure everybody is able to learn without distractions.

Classrooms:

In our classrooms, we expect all children to:

- Demonstrate STAR
- Work to the best of their ability
- Not have objects on tables that distract from learning
- Remain in their seats unless given permission to move
- Use the toilets during break and lunchtime (wherever possible) so as not to interrupt learning time
- Keep tables and work spaces tidy
- Keep the classroom and corridor areas tidy

Arrivals

We expect all children to:

- Arrive on time to school
- Follow the behaviour curriculum when on the playground before school
- Walk into class with responsible walking
- To greet staff with a smile and say good morning when spoken to
- Adults will be on the class doors to greet children at the start of the school day
- Hang up coats and bags, put lunch boxes on the trolley and water bottles in class
- Not leave again unless given permission from an adult in class
- Sit down and begin the morning task

Walking

We expect all children and adults to walk around school:

- Facing forwards
- In a straight line from the playground and to/from assembly
- With our hands by our sides
- Without talking, when in the corridors as other classes could still be learning
- Without leaning on walls whilst waiting

We use **responsible walking** to keep everyone safe in school and to make sure the learning of other children is not disrupted as we move around school.

Transitions

When the teacher signals the end of the lesson/day, we expect all children to:

- Demonstrate STAR
- Tidy their table and work space
- Collect their things quietly from the corridor when asked to
- Wait quietly until dismissed
- Tuck under chairs before leaving
- Stack chairs at the end of the day when asked to
- Leave the classroom with responsible walking
- Remember that other classes could still be learning

Worship:

We expect all children and adults to:

- Walk to Worship with responsible walking
- Remember that other classes could still be learning
- Respond to the quiet signal (hand up) with STAR and show respectful listening
- Sit sensibly, face the front and listen to the person leading assembly
- When prayers are taking place, sit respectfully if not taking the prayer as your own
- Leave Worship and walk back to class with responsible walking
- Remember that other classes could still be learning

Playtimes

We expect all children to:

- Leave the classroom and walk onto the playground with responsible walking
- Play safely without hurting anyone
- Not 'play fight' because someone may get hurt by accident
- Be kind, by including people in games and by sharing equipment. A kind person behaves in a gentle, caring and helpful way towards other people.
- Be respectful and look after any playground equipment, putting things away at the end of the session
- Line up straight away at the end of break when the whistle is blown or signal shown.
- Walk back to class using responsible walking
- Remember that other classes could still be learning

Lunchtimes

We expect all children to:

- Walk into and out of the Hall using responsible walking
- Line up and wait their turn by facing forwards and not leaning on walls
- Be respectful by saying 'please' and 'thank you' to the adults and each other
- Collect their food and sit down at their chosen table
- Use a quiet talking voice when in the hall and not raise their voices
- Respond to the quiet signal (hand up) with STAR
- Use a knife and fork correctly
- Not leave their seat without permission
- Clear any rubbish from the table and empty their trays
- Sit back down to wait for others to finish
- Help to clean the tables and floor when asked to
- When given permission, walk onto the playground using responsible walking
